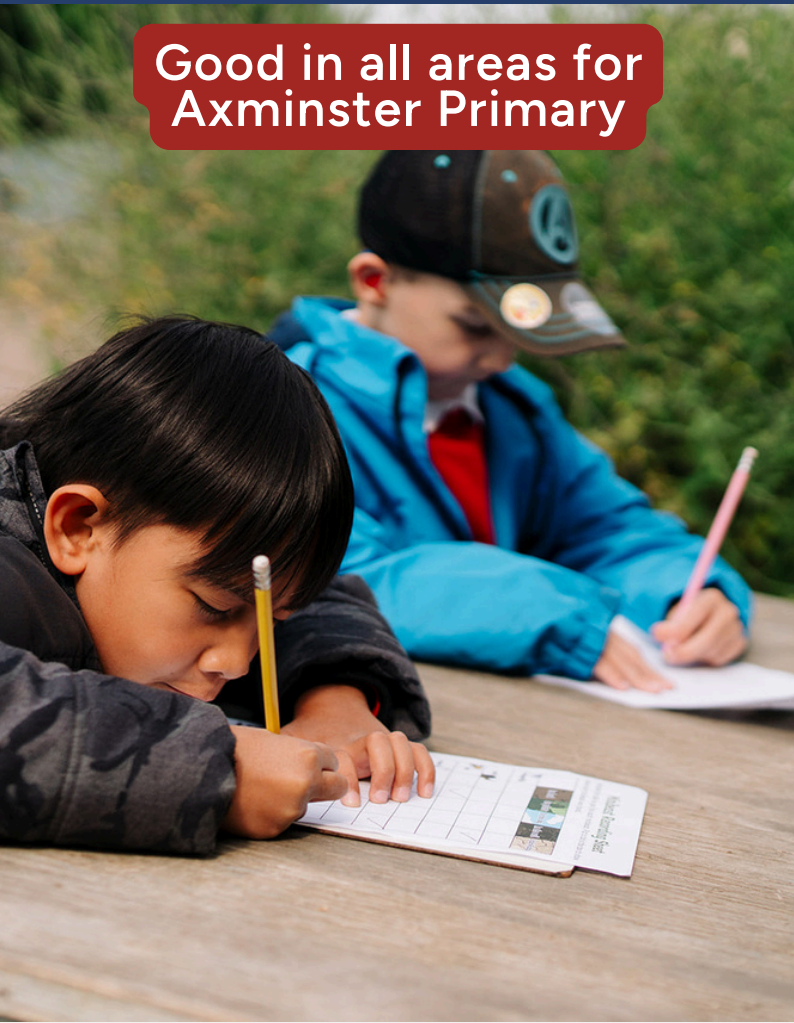

The collaborative project has been partly funded by the Department for Education (DfE) and Devon County Council, with plans approved by DfE last year to replace and renovate existing buildings, creating a modern new space for pupils' learning and development.

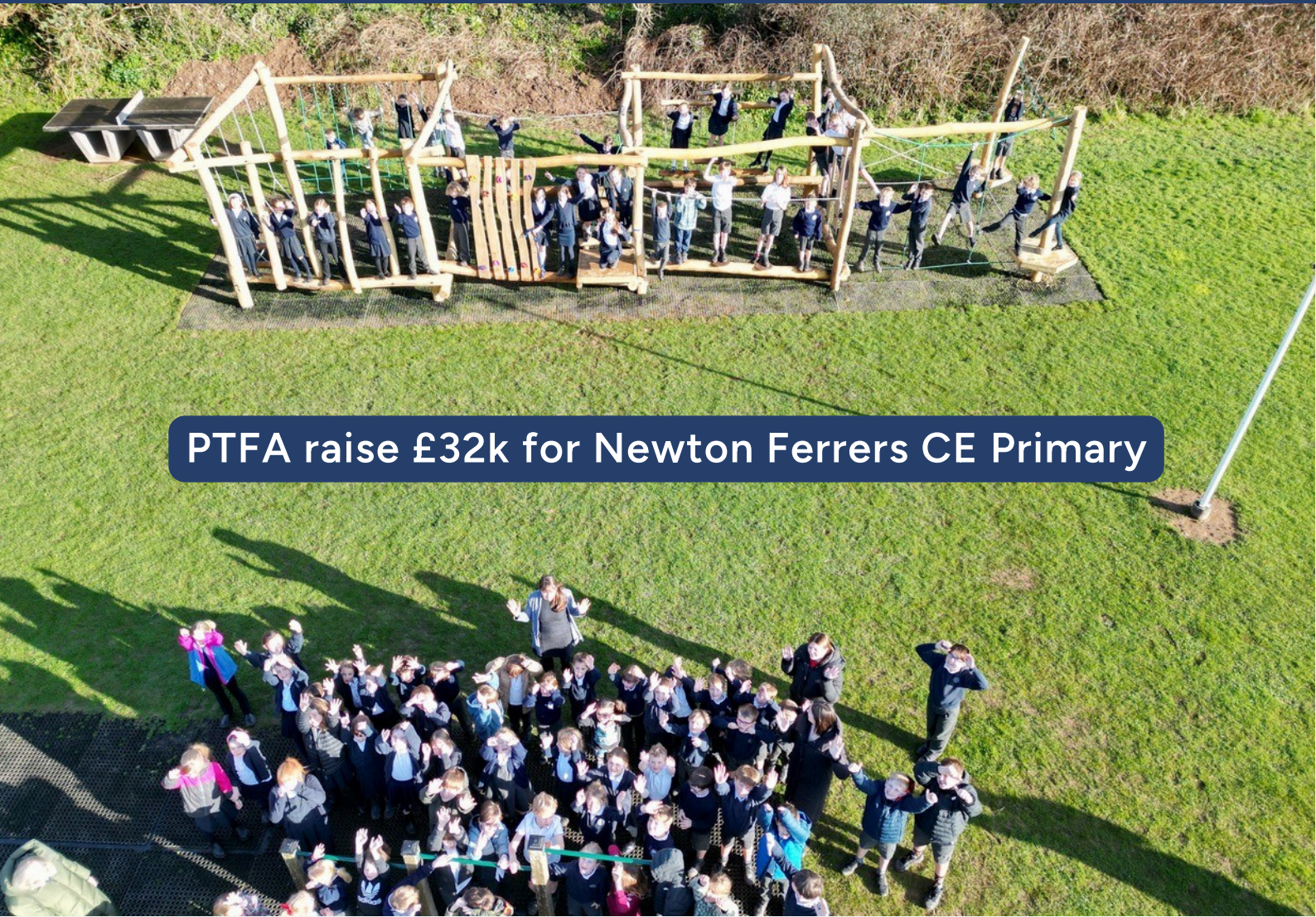

## PTFA raise £32k for Newton Ferrers CE Primary

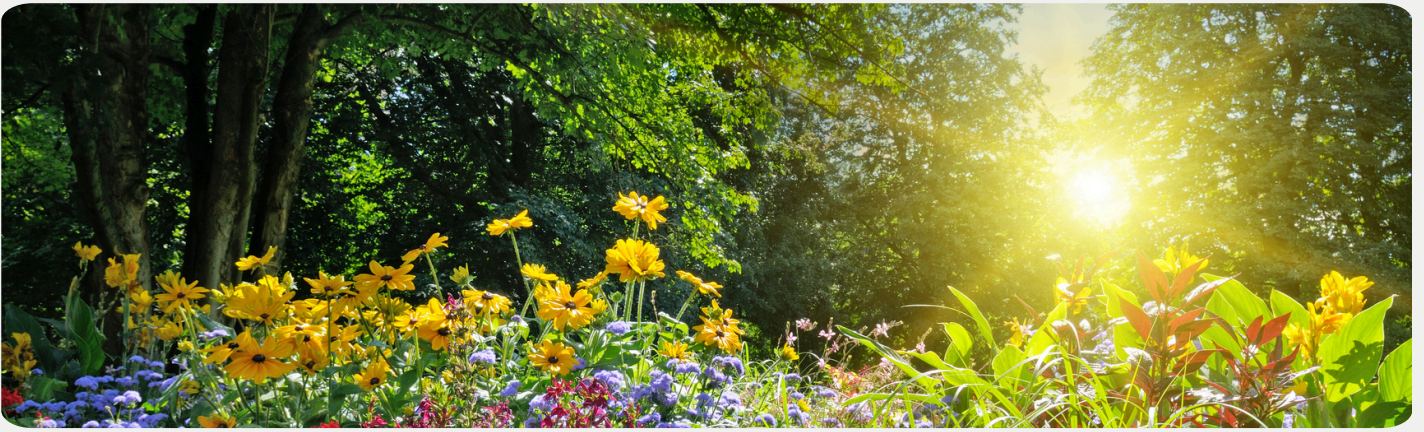

## Governance

### Parent Council Members

Their role is to undertake monitoring visits to their school and report the outcome to their Hub Board. The focus of the visits is set by the hub board, directors and parent council member.

The Trust currently has six Hub Boards. Each includes a member of the Trust school improvement team, a chair appointed by the Trust, a foundation representative, parent council members and some include members appointed based on their skills.
